




# Overview

The independent City of Petersburg consists of 23.1 square miles, located in south-central Virginia, along the eastern seaboard, approximately halfway between New York and Florida, Petersburg is situated at the juncture of I-95 and I-85, connecting the Southeastern U.S. and the Mid-Atlantic. Petersburg's city limits are bordered on its north by the Appomattox River. The city, strategically located at the junction of major Interstates -85 and -95, Virginia State Routes 1, 460, and 301, as well as the site of two mainline railroads, enables industries to easily access the markets of the Eastern Seaboard and Midwest U.S. In addition to being in proximity to Petersburg, the Port of Virginia, only 80 miles to the southeast in Hampton Roads, while I-95 provides quick and easy access to the Richmond Marine Terminal (RMT) — a deep-water terminal formerly known as the "Port of Richmond" less than 20 miles North of Petersburg.

The City of Petersburg is 23 miles south of Virginia's state capital, Richmond, and 125 miles south of the nation's capital, Washington, D.C. It is located within the Richmond–Petersburg Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA).



#### Bond Rating:

- A1 Bond Rating (Moody's Investor Service): Classifies Petersburg as a growing economy, with a strong financial position.

- Partnership for Petersburg:
  - Petersburg Founders Fund (PFF): Governor Glenn Youngkin announced the PFF as a part of this partnership it's a competitive, direct-grant program designed to assist in the growth of the City's economy and entrepreneurial ecosystem; a \$500,000 program seeded with state money, the fund awards grants of up to \$25,000 to potential and existing business owners as an incentive for building in Petersburg.
  - Sycamore Grove: The former Petersburg hospital site is being redeveloped with the partnership, featuring a grocery store anchor and a mix of retail, office, and residential units.
- Pharma Cluster: Chosen as the location for implementing an unprecedented and revolutionary industrial project, Petersburg has emerged into an Advanced Manufacturing Pharmaceutical cluster, with the opening of AMPAC Fine Chemicals, CivicaRx, and Phlow. The pharmaceutical cluster is bringing the manufacturing of essential ingredients for medicines back to the U.S.
- **Tourism/History:** Petersburg is remobilizing the Virginia Main St. program in the Downtown and Old Towne Historic District

#### Petersburg Area Transit

Petersburg Area Transit (PAT) offers fixed-route transit and ADA paratransit services throughout the city and surrounding region. PAT also operates an express route between Petersburg and Richmond, with four daily round trips. Excluding the express route, PAT covers approximately seven square miles and serves a population of around 72,000, with about 410,000 passenger trips annually. Weekday service starts from 6:00 am to 6:00 pm, while Saturday service begins an hour later.

Many Petersburg residents depend on transit services for employment, medical care, and food access. In this region, greater geographic coverage and proximity to origins/destinations are more crucial than frequent service.

## Government



#### **Government**

Petersburg is governed by a City Manager and a seven-member City Council.

The city has a comprehensive plan and zoning and subdivision ordinances.

#### <u>Taxes</u>

Localities in Virginia collect a 1% sales tax. They do not tax other items taxed at the state level.

Counties and cities in Virginia are separate taxing entities. Therefore, a company pays taxes to either a county or to a city.

Manufacturers pay real estate, machinery and tools, truck and automobile, utility, and sales taxes. They also may pay either a merchant's capital or a license tax.

Non-manufacturers pay real estate, tangible personal property, truck and automobile, utility, and sales taxes. They also may pay either a merchant's capital or a license tax.

#### <u>Safety</u>

#### Petersburg Bureau of Police

The Petersburg Bureau of Police, a premier law enforcement agency, focuses on community engagement, trust-building, and reducing crime. They collaborate with various partners, including Virginia's Attorney General's Office, the State Police, the Department of Juvenile Justice, and more. Police substations throughout the city enable quick deployment of officers and serve as liaisons between police, residents, and businesses.

Petersburg and the Commonwealth of Virginia work together to increase law enforcement presence. The Ceasefire Program, Group Violence Intervention Coordinators, and additional federal prosecutors contribute to reduced crime rates, including:

- 12% decrease in shootings
- 56% decrease in homicides
- 48% decrease in aggravated assaults.

### Community Profile—City of Petersburg Government



The Police Department, accredited by the Virginia Law Enforcement Professional Standards Commission, maintains high standards through collaboration across its five divisions: Administrative Services, Internal Affairs, Investigations, Operations, and Support Services.

#### Petersburg Fire, Rescue & Emergency Services

The Petersburg Department of Fire, Rescue, and Emergency Services is a forwardthinking, comprehensive fire department operating from five stations across the city. A range of services are offered, including:

- Emergency medical/rescue services providing basic and advanced pre-hospital life support
- Fire suppression activities
- Enforcement of fire, building, and housing codes
- Fire prevention initiatives and public fire safety education programs.



## Community

Petersburg has two hospitals that provide medical services to residents. Bon Secours Southside Medical Center is a 307-bed acute care facility with a staff of over 1,400 employees and almost 400 physicians representing all major specialties. The Medical Center serves the Petersburg Region. Medical services include 24-hour emergency care, surgery, trauma center, home health care, rehabilitation unit, physical therapy, and nuclear medicine. Poplar Springs Hospital, a 102-bed private psychiatric facility provides treatment programs for adults, adolescents, and the chemically dependent. Tri-Cities Hospital in Hopewell is easily accessible to Petersburg residents. This 147-bed facility also offers a full range of medical services including 24-hour emergency care, surgery, physical and occupational therapy, nuclear medicine, and intensive and coronary care. In addition to these facilities, the Richmond area has more than 3,500 physicians and 17 acute care and specialty hospitals with approximately 4,000 beds.\* Included within the Richmond area is the internationally renowned Virginia Commonwealth University Medical Center.

Because of the numerous and outstanding medical facilities located in the metropolitan area, Richmond has been designated as a "Prime Medical Center" by the American Medical Association.

The City of Petersburg has three facilities that provide nursing home care. With a total of 330 beds, these facilities offer long-term and intermediate care, as well as rehabilitative services.

There are around 100 physicians and 10 dentists who maintain practices in the city.

#### Pharmaceutical Cluster

#### AMPAC Fine Chemicals, CivicaRX, Phlow

Recent investments by pharmaceutical companies in Petersburg are positioning the city to revive its manufacturing sector and become a significant contributor to the U.S. domestic supply chain for essential medicines at risk of shortages.

The focal point of this development is the AMPAC Fine Chemicals plant in Petersburg, where nearly \$75 million has been invested to expand an existing pharmaceutical facility, creating almost 200 jobs.

Adjacent to the AMPAC plant, pharmaceutical manufacturer CivicaRX will soon open a \$124.5 million facility, generating nearly 200 more jobs, supported by a \$5.7 million grant from the state Commonwealth's Development Opportunity Fund.

These two companies have partnered with the Medicines for All Institute at Virginia Commonwealth University College of Engineering and Phlow Corp., a company established in 2020 to utilize advanced manufacturing processes developed by Medicines for All. Phlow's Petersburg manufacturing facility is currently under construction next to AMPAC, and the company has received a \$354 million, four-year federal contract from the U.S. Biomedical Advanced Research and Development Authority (BARDA) to produce essential medications.

The pharmaceutical cluster is being hailed as an "advanced manufacturing campus" that will draw similar companies offering high-paying jobs to Petersburg.

Over the next decade, Petersburg and the surrounding region are expected to attract supply chain industries, with the Pharma Cluster expanding to create hundreds of high-paying jobs and bring millions in investments.

#### Fort Gregg-Adams

The City of Petersburg shares its border with one of the Army's most diverse military posts, Fort Gregg-Adams. This installation serves as the Home of Army Sustainment, encompassing the Combined Arms Support Command and command groups for the Quartermaster, Ordnance, and Transportation Corps. Each year, over 70,000 troops train at Fort Gregg-Adams, and roughly one-third of all Army soldiers will either train or be stationed here during their careers.

Fort Gregg-Adams also hosts the U.S. Army Logistics University, offering more than 200 courses with over 2,300 military and civilian students attending classes daily. The International Studies program welcomes military personnel from over 30 allied countries.

The regional economic impact of Fort Gregg-Adams on Petersburg is approximately \$2.4 billion.
